balloons, creating a festive atmosphere. The event reinforced our dedication to supporting the local community, fostering unity and positive engagement. A great way to celebrate our 70th year.



Our Strategic Highlights Financial Year 2023-24

1. BE A VALUED AND PREFERRED PROVIDER

- Partnering organization to the successful **Multiple Employer Agreement** resulting in a move to supported bargaining with FairWork Australia.
- 10% increase in builders yard and clean up jobs.
- 57 programs of support on offer each week.
- 226 active NDIS participants.
- 10% increase in the number of support coordination recipients.
- Became a distribution point for Good 360 with over 4 pallets of goods donated to schools and organizations within the district estimated at \$65,000.
- Commenced the Clean Team contract with MRCC at Powerhouse Place.



2. PROVIDE EXCELLENCE IN SERVICE AND SUPPORT

- Finalist in the Learn Local awards for our introduction to Disability course.
- NDIS,ISO9001, NAID, HACCAP and social traders certification as well as global; **People, Planet First verification** as a social enterprise
- New Mildura Chocolate Company factory commenced building on-site at 115 Twelfth street.
- Opening of Walker's Place as a venue training and hire space at **GrowAbility**
- **4260 hours** of volunteering for the community, Second Bite, Hot Air balloon event, Jacaranda Village, Walk Against Violence.

WJ Christie Centre was created after parents of people with a disability decided they wanted a Mildura-based service. The service was originally for 3 days a week with an enrolment of 4 children and 3 adults.

Dulcie Stone was appointed supervisor.

 The Christie Centre began to expand its services to cater to adults. establishing vocational training and life skills programs. The centre became a key player in advocating for the rights of people with disabilities, working to ensure they had access to employment and social inclusion in the community.

advocacy Focus shifted towards community integration, emphasizing the importance of inclusion and breaking down barriers between people with disabilities and the broader community.

1990's Growth and Advocacy • The Christie Centre experienced significant growth in services, expanding day programs, supported employment options, and individualized support plans. Increased focus on advocacy, with Christie Centre becoming a regional voice for disability rights, inclusion, and equal opportunities in education and employment.

A Timeline of Service

• This decade saw the introduction of innovative programs focused on personcentered care, fostering individual goals and aspirations. Expansion of vocational training programs and the creation of disability enterprises, enabling participants to develop valuable skills while contributing to the local economy.

Name changed to *Christie Centre Inc.* Magnolia Avenue was renamed *ArtRageUs. Mildura Chocolate Company* launched.

> 2000's Innovation and Transition

The introduction of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) in 2013 marked a new era for disability services. The Christie Centre adapted its service model to align with NDIS, focusing on individualized, participant-driven support plans. The Christie Centre further diversified its offerings with programs

in arts, employment and social activities, enhancing the quality of life for participants.

Respite opportunities introduced.

Sunraysia All Abilities Cricket Carnival started in consultation with Cricket Victoria and Mallee Sports Assembly.

Sliding door installed at CC to ensure accessibility for all.

Named *Learning and Development Regional Service of the Year* (2015).

\$1M state of the art *Enhanced Living Accommodation* units opened on Boyden Street.

New packaging collaboration between Mildura Chocolate Company and ArtRageUs artists.

First successful Night Glow community launch at the Mildura Golf Club.

Participants carried the *Flame of Hope* for the Special Olympics Australia.

Aroundagain Document Destruction became NAID certified.

2010's The NDIS Era Begins Despite challenges, including rising operational costs and NDIS funding adjustments, the Christie Centre continued to deliver high-quality, person-directed services.

The Centre celebrated its 70th anniversary in 2024, reflecting on decades of service and its strong role as a place-based provider in the Mildura region.

2020 - 2024 Resilience and Achievements The Centre's achievements were highlighted by extraordinary outcomes for participants and the continued dedication of staff to foster independence, inclusion and empowerment.

COVID-19 came into Australia which involved statewide lockdowns across 2020-2022 and reduced services for Disability Support Services and Social Enterprises.

Sunny Street Singers placed first in their section at *Mildura Eisteddfod* (2022).

Mildura Chocolate Company secured partnership with Bonza for chocolate speckles (2023).

GrowAbility Nursery was flooded and had to move all stock and team to both Aroundagain and Community partner *SuniTAFE* (2023).

Powerhouse Precinct opportunity arose for CC to take on the kiosk branded *Spark* (2023).

Pathways to Employment was introduced to allow a smoother transition for people with a disability to supported employment (2020).

New Multiple Enterprise Agreement structured for Support Services roll out.


3. BUILD ON SUSTAINABILITY

- **165 ton** of document destruction diverted from landfill included in the circular economy being recycled into A grade paper.
- Opened **SPARK** a Visitor Inspiration Point at Powerhouse Place, employing 14 people part time and providing social procurement opportunities for 17 social enterprises.
- 85 tonnes of waste diverted from landfill via Aroundagain.
- Improved irrigation at GrowAbility reducing amount of water used.
- Commenced the **Can Deposit Scheme** at Aroundagain with **300,000** cans and bottles processed in 6 months. Identified in the Top 5 providers via audit.
